Robinet Well Deepening on Oilfield Lease

Deepening of the Robinet well on the Oilfield Enterprises lease in Torrance was started this week, according to the State Division of Oil and Gas. Deepening or redrilling jobs last week numbered 26, as compared with 31 during the previous week.

Abandonments throughout the state this week totaled 13, as compared with 39 during the previous week. Total to date this year was given as 312 as against 302 last year. Oil field operations reported during the week ending May 22, show 45 notices to drill new wells filed, as compared with 70 during the previous week.

Of the 45 notices to drill new wells filed this week, three each were for wells in Huntington Beach and Wilmington fields, one in Newhall-Potrero field, one in Orange County, two in Rincon field, one each in Lompoc, Orcutt and Santa Maria Valley fields, one in Monterey County, four each in Kern River and Stanset fields, two each in Edison, Poso Creek and South Belridge fields, one each in Cymric, Elk Hills, Kern Front, Lost Hills, Midway, Mt. Poso, Mountain View, North Coles Levee, Round Mountain and Wheeler Ridge fields, three in Kern County, two in Coalinga field, one in Raisin City field, and one in Fresno County. Total new wells this year, 1987, as compared with 793 at the same date last year.

Area Placed In New Community Chest Division

A ninth major campaign division of the Community Chest area has been set up, known as the Harbor Area, to help perfect the organization of thousands of volunteers who will be needed to work in the Fall campaign for 159 Red Feather agencies in Torrance, Lomita, Palos Verdes, San Pedro, Harbor City, and Wilmington, according to Chest central headquarters.

Willis H. Merrill of Wilmington, a long-time volunteer in the lower ranks, has been appointed by Edward Mills, chairman of metropolitan campaigns, to head the new area.

According to the practice in all previous Chest campaigns, each city and town united in the annual fund-raising appeal will raise its proportionate share of the overall goal by local citizens and under local leadership.

Currently, Merrill is president of Wilmington Chamber of Commerce, is a Rotarian, and serves on the boards of directors of Wilmington Community Center and its Young Men's Christian Association, which each receive Chest support. He is assistant general manager of Copra Oil and Meal Company.
