FHA financing will be available under Title VI, Taper said, and the subdivision will have curbs and walks as well as sewers, water and gas and paved streets. Lots will average 55 by 110 feet in area, with the duplex lots 60 by 110 feet.
A model home will be finished as the first unit, and construction will proceed on other houses in the meantime. The tract owners recently subdivided Orange Manor in the North Long Beach district.
The new tract will be known as Torrance Gardens, Taper said.

Net sales of \$49,600,000 for the six-month period ending April 30 were reported by Dresser Industries, Inc., of which the International Derrick and Equipment Company of Torrance is a subsidiary.
The company is installing new machine tools in many of its plants, it was stated, in its program to modernize its factories. Dresser companies supply equipment for many phases of the oil industry.
The company also manufactures many gas-burning appliances, and has a backlog of more than \$43,000,000.


