School Board Sets Budget

Ingram was authorized by the board this week to prepare contracts for purchase of books for the school year 1948-49 at prices received from vendors on a recent "percentage off list price" bid.

"This procedure will enable us to save about 33 percent on books, and we can save time as well as trouble in purchases next year," the business manager said.

Employment of various non-certificated personnel by the district for the school year was approved by the board at this week's meeting, and employment of 12 new persons also was approved.

Heading the list was Doris Shaltee as secretary to the superintendent, J. H. Henrich Hull, and under new personnel, employment of Rose Mary Blocker as secretary to the high school principal.

Other new personnel listed include Edna F. Alterton, special record clerk; Rene Schumacher, attendance clerk; Evelyn Lewis, adult education clerk; Bertram Raines as gardener; Carl Pisel, head custodian; Avon Mitchell, Thomas E. Hood and Raymond D. Richhart as custodians; Mrs. Leitha Sells and Elaine C. Williams as clerks and Eugene W. Hollomon as carpenter's helper.

Purchase of miscellaneous school equipment now in ownership of Redondo Union High School District was authorized by the Board Tuesday night at a total cost of \$30,000, to be paid in two installments.

This is to include school furniture and books in Torrance High School and personal property, but is not to include any school buses or the pickup truck, or any personal property and equipment in the auto shop.

The board set Sept. 6 and June 10 as the opening and closing dates of school next year. Nine holidays will be observed.

The Child Care Center was allotted a budget of \$45,615.

National Guard Engineer Group Enlisting Men

Young men between 19 and 25 who want to enlist in the 578th Combat Engineer Battalion, a local group, may report for interview during the day or evenings at three places, according to Major Robert L. Lewellen, California National Guard.

During the day interviews are held at the battalion headquarters at Torrance Municipal Airport, on Highway 101, and at the Army Recruiting office, 1337 El Prado, Torrance. From 2 to 9 p.m. daily officers may be contacted at the Armory in the Torrance ball park.

Enlistments are for three years for non-veterans or one year for veterans, and men enlisting before the President signs the draft bill are exempt from its provisions. Specialist ratings also are open to veterans, Major Lewellen said, and 17-year-olds must have their parents' consent to enlist.

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
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
