'Breaking the Colt' Painting Selection of P. V. Art Group

The first annual prize exhibit of the Palos Verdes Community Arts Association closed on June 14. Prior to the opening of the exhibit a group of competent artists had selected five from a collection of 31 water colors submitted. By secret ballot the public then indicated its preference while the pictures were in the Palos Verdes Art Gallery from May 16 to June 14.

That the choice of the general public was a wise one is indicated by comments of critics on the artist's work. "Talent so original as to overwhelm more timid souls." "That is the artist's special secret, this remains with him, this use of medium in all of its wealth, vengeance, rawness and dramatic conclusion."

That the selection was a popular one is shown by the fact that it received over half the total votes cast for the five final contestants. "Breaking the Colt," by Dan Lutz of Los Angeles thus becomes the first of a permanent collection of the paintings of contemporary American artists which the Community Arts Association has inaugurated.

Y.W.C.A. Announces Arts, Crafts Class at Harbor Hospital



Anyone may enter this class. Those interested please enroll as soon as possible with the YWCA office, 1339 Post Avenue, Torrance 1356.



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
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
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
