Red Cross to Aid Polio

Attention—registered nurses! At the request of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, the nursing service department of the Los Angeles Red Cross chapter this week launched a campaign aimed to recruit 55 registered nurses to assist in the care of polio patients at General Hospital.

Nurses who can answer this plea assistance at the unaffiliated hospital are asked to contact the Red Cross at Fitzroy 5261, Ext. 68, for assignment in the polio wards, it was announced by Miss M. Louise Floyd, nursing service director.

"Recruitment to date has been slow and the Red Cross has been asked to do all possible to secure nurses to augment the regular staff at General Hospital in this emergency," Miss Floyd declared.

First to enroll for duty was Mrs. Mary E. Pelesch of Hawthorne, a veteran polio fighter. Two years ago Mrs. Pelesch assisted at General Hospital, and in 1947 answered the call when nurses were being dispatched to Boise, Idaho.

At the same time the Red Cross announced that more than a score of volunteer nurses' aides are taking "refresher" courses at Orthopedic Hospital in Los Angeles "to learn new techniques in the use of the Kenny" pack in treatment of post-polio patients."

Studying the polio situation here and elsewhere along the Pacific Coast this week was Raymond H. Barrows, newly named manager of the American Red Cross Pacific Area office in San Francisco. The west coast headquarters of the Red Cross today is assisting in recruitment of registered nurses for duty at Boise, Idaho, El Centro, San Diego and other areas, and "may be called upon to aid in the Los Angeles crisis," Barrows said.



ANNA DANNENHAUER Receives Citation

Mrs. Dannenhauer Receives VFW Citation for Service

For some people accepting an office or chairmanship in any organization is a matter of little importance but to others the work required to fulfill that position requires thought, time and a sense of profound loyalty to the principles for which the organization stands.

Among the many faithful and conscientious officers and chairmen of the Lomita Post No. 1622, Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary over a period of years is Mrs. George (Anna) Dannenhauer of 24993 Woodward avenue.

A past president of the local auxiliary and member of the organization for the past 14 years, Mrs. Dannenhauer has possibly done her best work as hospital chairman. Having served for the past three years in this capacity, she has accepted the work for another year.

For her meritorious service the Department of California, Veterans of Foreign Wars, in annual convention in June recognized her outstanding record and awarded her the silver citation and medal.

In a recent report to her local unit Mrs. Dannenhauer stated that she had traveled 950 miles to veterans' hospitals during the past year. Although she and many of the other members had visited the Naval Hospital at Long Beach, most of the trips were to the Veterans' Hospital at Sawtelle.

With the assistance of members of the sewing club of the unit, Mrs. Dannenhauer has been successful in meeting the local unit's quota of hospital socks each year. Adopting a war-time 15 men at Sawtelle the local unit has been able to supply them with pocket editions, mystery stories, knitted toe socks, stumpy socks and soakers which are made of cheese cloth and filled with layers of newspapers for use in their hospital care. Clean usable clothing has been taken to both the men and women patients, cigarettes, gum, candy and other items have been distributed among the patients and many articles have been taken to the men for use in the shops to aid in rehabilitation work. These have included old socks, ladies' purses, radios and many other articles which the men have been able to use in repairing furniture and other household articles. A wheel chair also was taken to the hospital at Sawtelle during the past year, Mrs. Dannenhauer reported.
