Protection of Enlistee Jobs Is Explained

Job protection for men with prior military service who volunteer for three-year enlistments in the U. S. Army or the U. S. Air Force is guaranteed by the Selective Service Act of 1948, it was announced. Reserve officers and Reserve enlisted men called to active duty are as fully protected under the same re-employment rights of the act. The law states that any man who makes application for re-employment within 90 days after release or honorable discharge shall be restored to his former civilian position at the same pay and without loss of seniority or other benefits. These employment rights do not apply to enlistment in any of the Reserve components.

Bronze Plaque On Membership Awarded Lions

Torrance Lions Club was presented with a Lions International membership quota bronze plaque at its meeting Tuesday noon in the Woman's clubhouse. Dr. Rollin R. Smith, deputy district governor, congratulated the club for building its membership from 38 to 54 in the year ended last June 30, in handing the plaque to the officers. "This club has played an important part in helping to make the year an outstanding one in the history of the International Association of Lions Clubs," Dr. Smith told President William Greene of the Torrance club, and Albert Isen, immediate past president in whose regime the gains were accomplished. Lions International is the largest service club organization, with more than 6837 clubs in 24 nations, and more than 360,000 members.
