

New Council on Child Care Center Elects

Mrs. Beatrice Bunde is the chairman of the newly formed Torrance Council for Child Care Centers, organized at a meeting held in the Day Nursery on Martina avenue.

Mrs. Theresa Russell was elected vice-chairman, Maxine Gill secretary, and Mrs. Bernice Niles was named treasurer. The council plans to meet the first Friday night of each month.

The new council hopes to assist in having the Child Care program made a permanent part of the state's activities, Mrs. Bunde said. There are some 115 day nurseries in Los Angeles county, each caring for from 25 to 40 children from 2 to 6 years old.

The Extended Day Care, which is the other half of the Child Care program, provides similar care for children of elementary school age.

In most cases these children are from families where mother is required to work, such as GI families where the fathers are disabled or still attending school or where the mothers are widowed or divorced and are the sole support of the child.

Mrs. Bunde attended the state legislative conference of the California Parents' Association of Child Care, held at Fresno last week end.

Editor:

Proposition 15 on the Nov. 2 ballot seeks to set aside a sanctuary for our sardine and other small fish by establishing a three-mile limit against purse seining. It does not bar any other type of fishing gear which supply your table fish. . . . It does not bar nets for taking of bait for commercial or sports fishing.

Everything increases in cost when it becomes scarce. Fish are scarce, cost is high. Doesn't it seem reasonable that by protecting what little we have to eventually propagate and give us more, that the price of fish will come down, rather than rise?

Opponents of the proposition will weep and wail that the ocean sports fishermen are unfair and unjust and want to set the entire ocean aside for their private fishing ground. Remember last year how the opponents wanted to still hold onto the fat proceeds they derived from the recent opening of Catalina Island during the war? Sure, fish were plentiful there and the island waters were closed to their destructive nets for years, and the fish had a chance to propagate. Torrance sportsmen's feelings are based on their sincere desire to see California's natural resources remain in the hands of all the people, where it rightfully belongs.

Don't get us wrong, we like the fishing industry and want it to continue to bring in the millions of dollars to California. That is why we are interested in preserving the fish so the industry will continue to live.


