Jack Bassett Wins \$1000 Tenpin Purse

Jack Bassett, local kegler, is pretty sharp when it comes to arithmetic—especially pertaining to bowling.

He did it all figured out that if he knocked over 1738 points during the recent Virginia Recreation Singles Classic at 575 cents per point he would win \$1000—and that is exactly what he did.

Bassett led a field of top Southern California bowlers with eight games of 216, 205, 226, 171, 241, 223, 245 and 211. He has a book average of 185.

Yarbrough in fourth place with 1679 was a little short. He got off to a slow start with three games under 200, namely 166, 192 and 168. The next five games, he tightened control and came up with five games over the 200 mark—216, 237, 246, 257 and 201. He brought home the fourth largest piece of bacon, which was worth \$137.50.

Bassett's win of \$1000 during the three-day Long Beach Tournament was one of the largest ever won by a Torrance bowler, it is believed.




