

Parents Hurt in Crash But Baby Escapes

Richard A. Clavesilla, 18, and his wife Irene, 18, of 1701 W. 182nd street, Torrance, are recovering today from severe jaw and leg injuries received in a traffic accident at Olympic boulevard near Fox Hills drive early Monday morning.

The Los Angeles police said they believed Clavesilla fell asleep while driving the car, which struck a retaining wall and a light standard. The couple's two-month-old baby girl, Rosalyn, who was riding between them, escaped injury.

Clavesilla's teeth were knocked out, his jaw fractured and his leg injured, while his wife has a compound fracture of the jaw and other head injuries.

City Purchases Warning Signs

Purchase of 20 more traffic warning and regulatory signs to be placed at strategic points throughout the city has been authorized by the Torrance City Council, at a cost of \$200.

The council also authorized the employment of three school crossing guards—Mrs. Rayonette Brown, John Eisen-trait and R. M. Jones, at compensation of 95 cents per hour.

Other appropriations authorized were: Purchase of road oil for Arlington avenue between 190th and 182nd street, \$1000.

Purchase of building materials for the foundation for the Walteria library building, \$175.

Survey of 10 Santa Fe Railroad street crossings by the Title Insurance and Trust Company, \$225.

El Camino Expects 600 Gain Oct. 1

Gain in enrollment of 600 students is expected at El Camino College by Oct. 1, according to H. J. Sheffield, director of student personnel.

Enrollment figures for the second year of its existence are expected to exceed 2000 as compared to 1410 last spring. A year ago, during the school's first registration, the college enrolled 1170. The faculty numbered 33 then as compared to 44 for the current year.

Two Teachers Added to List for Walteria

Employment of two additional elementary teachers for the Walteria School was authorized Tuesday night by the Board of Education to permit additional half-day sessions on account of the extremely high enrollment.

The teachers employed are Marilyn Hickson and Carroll E. Wright.

Employment of the following additional non-certificated personnel also was approved by the board: John G. Doolittle, Gilbert Sanders and James S. McGhee as custodians, the latter two on an "as needed" basis; Clyde H. Bull as a clerk.

The board authorized a mileage allowance of 6 1/2 cents per mile for the school nurse, the attendance officer, the home visiting teacher, the director of adult education and the new director of instruction, Walter Rehwoidt.

Schools Call Attention to Absence Rule

Enrollment at Torrance public schools now is well past the 2600 mark, according to reports made to the Torrance Board of Education Tuesday night.

However, while that is the enrollment figure, only 2706 pupils actually attended school the day the count was made Friday, Sept. 17, the reports revealed. This absence figure of 199 has prompted school officials to explain that illness is the only real and legal excuse for a child not being in school.

Torrance High School enrollment figure was given as 638, the junior high as 446, and Torrance elementary, largest of the four elementary schools, 748. Fern had 439, Walteria 379, many of them on half-day sessions, and Perry 257.

Schools Given \$50,000 Loan

A temporary loan of \$50,000 of county school funds to the Torrance Unified School District has been approved by the Board of Supervisors.

The loan, one of 31 made to the various districts in the county, is from the county school district emergency fund and will fill the local district over until tax funds start to come in next November and December.

El Camino Junior College received a \$30,000 loan under a similar transfer. All transfers were recommended by C. C. Trillingham, county schools superintendent, who explained that these 38 districts were without funds to cover regular expenses and maintenance, and that the amount borrowed does not exceed 50 percent of the tax money due the districts next December.
