A lighter, slightly more streamlined Gaucho varsity than last year's is on tap for this season's nine-game campaign.

Eight veterans from the '47 outfit, Backs Greg Biller, Bill Stitts, Aldo Giacopuzzi and Jack Sonnichsen, Ends Jack Robertson and Lowell Summerford, Tackle Ray Hutson and Guard Forrest Bell showed up for the first workout.

Much of the spread offense developed by Loughborough and Assistant Walt Kuns will center about a 180-pound junior, Boom-in' Bill Stitts, all-Marine League for two consecutive seasons.

Stitts is slated to handle most of the passing and punting as well as the heavy line plunging, where he excels.


