New Time Set for Telephone Hour Program

Red Cross Needs Additional Aides for Social Welfare

Increase in military personnel due to the new draft law prompted Los Angeles Red Cross to ask for volunteers who can serve the home service department in its "telephone information and emergency communications" division.

"To meet this need, Los Angeles Chapter must recruit several women by Oct. 20, when a 50-hour training class for Red Cross social welfare aides gets under way," Mrs. Alfred Long, executive chairman, declared.

Training class graduates will be asked to give a minimum of one full work day per week at chapter house headquarters, 1200 S. Vermont avenue. Mrs. Long stated. Duties will include the verification of requests for emergency furloughs and obtaining material for filing reports on conditions at home sought by men in the armed forces.

Women who have at least two years of college training or its equivalent in work experience, interested in serving Red Cross in this phase of its program, are asked to call Fitzroy 5261, Ext. 124.
