## Prognosticators Rogers Back in as No. 1 Picker

Rogers, with Judge Otto Willett and A. C. Turner (father of Quarterback Dick Turner) picked Torrance to win over Jordan by six points. Thus they were each only one point off.

Rogers low average from last week plus one point this week put him a scant two points ahead of Bill Tolson, Jr., who is in second place with 13 points.

All other prognosticators are grouped rather close together except Police of Chief John Stroth who is crowding Jack Baldwin, Torrance Herald Sports Editor who have 58 and 56 points respectively for the bottom rung. Stroth's mis-picking has remained unexplained while Baldwin's second guessing has remained so as a matter of request. ## Jordan Tumbled By Tartars; Schultz Sparks Victors

What a ball game! This was the unanimous expression this week of football fans who saw the thrill-packed razzle-dazzle contest last Saturday night in Long Beach where the underdog Tartars outplayed, outran and outpassed a heavier and highly-touted squad from David Starr Jordan, who lost the league game to Torrance 7-0.

From the opening whistle until the final gun (few heard it because of the roar from the stands) the Bay League opener for both teams was a thriller. The brilliant line-crashing of Dutch Schultz at end, who broke through the Panther barrier time and time again to smear one, two, and three would-be blockers and nail the ball-packer to the wall behind his own line of scrimmage, was admitted by players and coaches alike to be in a large degree responsible for the upset.

Schultz' surprising show was the result of a last-minute substitution. Jim Webb, regular Tartar end, was benched for a week by school authorities for an infraction of a school ruling. Coach Eddie Cole moved Schultz from tackle to Wobbly's spot where he "found himself" and put cleat marks in the Jordan's turf that are there to stay for a long time.

In the backfield there was fire, too. Co-Captains Milo Goettsch and Dick Turner would put many a burlesque queen to shame the way they snake-hipped their way through the Panther backfield. The Tartar line would

smash into the Jordan forward wall which would collapse at the seams. Through the hole would go Goettsch wiggling and squirming—running as though each of his legs had two knees. Turner with a little less finesse would lower his head and go.

Torrance drew blood in the second quarter after a pass by Turner good for 50 yards. Turner hoisted the pigskin to End Jim Taylor standing on the 25-yard strip, who ran it to within two yards of pay dirt. Goettsch went over right tackle for the tally.

Turner's toe made it seven to nary. The Panthers came back and made their only serious bid for a score after a 45-yard drive that stopped on the one-foot line as the half ended.

Torrance came back in the third period causing the Jordan fans to chant, "Hold that line." The Tartars wormed their way down to the 20-yard marker where Bill Ingram of Jordan took a Torrance pass on the three and was spilled on the five. They booted out of trouble.

In the fourth chorus it was the same old song as the Tartars downed a punt on their own 42 and then marched to the Jordan 22. The Panthers took over. With seconds left to play Goettsch snatched an intercepted pass on the 45-yard marker and scooted to the 18,

where the game was called on account of time.

A look at the following statistics would leave little doubt in anybody's mind who played the best ball game. The local lads had twice as many first downs as their foes and gained more than twice as many yards as their rivals. Jordan netted 32 yards from running. This was held to a minimum by the line-crashing of Torrance's light forward wall (171 pounds average) breaking through the panthers first defense (207 pounds) to smear the backfield way, 'way back of the line.
