## Columbia to Put Millions in New Plant

The industrial future of the West since the end of the war and it is hopeful that it will come off a winner. Chairman Olds told the press. "Big Steel" and its subsidiaries evidence "our faith and belief in the development of the West Coast."  
"I can't feel otherwise when I hear about all the people that come here every day," he said.  
Referring to the projected \$30,000,000 cold reduction sheet mill at Torrance, President Fairless said that he "hoped" that this production would reduce the cost of sheet steel for Southland manufacturers.  
"Many fabricators undoubtedly will be attracted to Southern California and other plants already here will enlarge their facilities because of the increased availability of sheets," Fairless said.  
Both Olds and Fairless expressed "unalterable opposition" to the Supreme Court decision wiping out steel's basic-point system of merchandizing its products, charging that this eliminated competition between distant steel producers and those located nearer to the customer.  
Fairless said he hoped that the next Congress will enact legislation "to permit competition on a general basis in the industry."  
"The basic-point system was not collusive," Olds said. "It preserved competition and was fair to both producer and consumer. Now the producer is not permitted to meet the price of a competitor who is more favorably located."  
Olds also defended steel profits, saying that criticism of them centered on dollar volume "which doesn't mean a thing" and ignored percentage figures.  
He said earnings are at about 6 per cent and added:  
"You are entitled to make more money when your operations are at 100 per cent than when you are operating at 60 or 70 per cent of capacity."

The California plant, already in production on the material with one reactor, will convert it more to turn out some 15,000 long tons.  
Goodyear's expansion is part of the government's program to step-up the output of this material from 21,000 to 183,000 long tons a year. Conversion work, started immediately, will take about a year to complete, and will result in the Goodyear company being the nation's largest single supplier of the material.  
Announcement of the conversion work at Hottel came as the plant marked its fifth anniversary, during which time it produced more than 600 million pounds of synthetic.

## Union Charter Is Revoked


