Zinc-Coated Items Raised by Columbia

Columbia Steel Company, subsidiary of United States Steel, announced Friday that by reason of an increase of \$40 a ton in the price of zinc, made by leading zinc producers, they have made effective at 12:01 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 20, corresponding adjustments in prices. The items affected are galvanized sheets and other flat-rolled products coated with zinc, in accordance with a standard formula by which the prices of these zinc-coated products are automatically advanced or reduced depending upon the current price for zinc. Under this formula, Columbia Steel has revised coating extra for all galvanized sheet products produced by it, amounting to an average price increase of approximately \$2.50 a ton, or an increase of about 2 percent. This price increase will affect approximately 7 percent of the total volume of sales of all steel products by Columbia Steel.

New Import Is Seen for Ft. M'Arthur

Fort MacArthur in San Pedro is destined to become one of the major army training centers in the nation because of its proximity to the great population center of Los Angeles. This was the opinion of General Mark Clark, 6th Army Commander, who this week inspected the regular army reservation which will be used to train some 15,000 reserve officers and 200 reserve units in the Los Angeles area. General Clark explained that about \$35,000 already has been allocated to the Fort MacArthur area for training facilities and more money would be forthcoming for additional developments.

Marek, public health nurse-instructor. The film deals with infant habits and their mental and physical growth up to five years of age. A review film, "Care of the Newborn Baby," will also be shown during the afternoon. Although this is the seventh in this series of classes, prospective mothers still may register in the course.

Brush-Off New Sweeper Beginning To Show Results

The City of Torrance is going in for tricycles, but not the kind normally found under the tree on Christmas morning. First of the two-wheelers to be added to city-owned equipment was a three-wheel police motorcycle, and now comes a three-wheel street sweeper. To a hapless worm in its path the machine looks like a cross-eyed monster brushing its teeth. The monster was unleashed on city streets last week to feed on a diet of papers, leaves, glass, tin cans and election posters in the gutters of the city's thoroughfares. Whiskbrooming along at about four to five miles per hour, the three-wheeled machine sweeps about 20 miles of gutters in a day. Given to nocturnal habits the machine starts out at 4 o'clock. The business district gets a once-over lightly each morning before it starts off for the leaf-dropping trees on the parkways in the residential section of the city. R. S. Perkins, superintendent of parks and streets, says the gimmick accomplishes in one day what would take a dozen men to do in a week. Like most pedegrees the "thing" has a hard time digesting everything thrown its way. For instance, two by fours, hunks of concrete and large tree limbs cause the bug quite a bit of indigestion trouble. Perkins urges residents to refrain from putting such material in the gutters.

MEMO TO CITY FATHERS: How about pasturing the "thing-a-mob" for a few days each week on the city's parking lots to pick up broken bottles.

Employment Office Lists 2200 Jobless

As of this week 2200 persons are registered as unemployed and seeking work through the Torrance office of the California State Employment Service, according to Winona Ellis, manager. Of the total 1374 are men and 826 are women, and 45 per cent of the men are veterans. In the list are 124 professional, chemists, engineers, pharmacists, photographers, window trimmers, commercial artists, store and office managers, and draftsman. There are 380 clerical people file clerks — bookkeepers, stenographers, file clerks, timekeepers, tabulating machine operators, telephone operators and stock clerks. Sales clerks and salesmen seeking employment total 134. There also are six domestics—day workers primarily. Largest single group is skilled workers—bakers, garment makers, seamstresses, tool and die makers, lathe operators, electricians, sheet metal workers, boilermakers, welders, meat cutters, carpenters, cement finishers, and stationary engineers. Next largest group is the semi-skilled—truck drivers, sub-assemblers, service station attendants, drill press operators, milling machine operators and various other shop trades. Service people out of work number 279, including cooks, waitresses, beauty operators, practical nurses and janitors.

Division for Precinct 24 to Be Asked

Division of Torrance Precinct 24 for the next election will be requested by the City Council, as the result of an appeal from Comm. W. M. Mason of the Hollywood Riviera Home Owners Association. "We have a registration of 426 voters in our precinct," Mason told the council, "and it is too much to ask a mother to neglect her home for nearly 40 consecutive hours while she serves on the election board. Some different arrangement is needed." Mason said he believed that a 95 percent vote was cast, which required one board to work from 6 a.m. Tuesday until 6 p.m. Wednesday before the actual count was completed. The tally's then had to be brought to the Torrance City Hall. Councilman George Powell said he would urge the city clerk, A. H. Bartlett, to work with Registrar of Voters Ben Hite. Dist. bonds . . . . .07 Total 2.17 The levy for the local bond issue is for one and a half years, Ingram also explained.
