Mayor Pro Tem George Powell accepted honorary membership in the Y-Teens in a ceremony which took place on the Civic Auditorium steps. Miss Ellen Koehn, president of the Y-Teen-Timers presented Mr. Powell with his Y-Teen button to bring the attention of the citizens of Torrance to the observance of the second annual nation-wide Y-Teen Roll Call Week of the Young Women's Christian Association, a Red Feather agency, from October 10 to 16. This was the announcement made today by Mrs. J. P. Montague, chairman of the local YWCA committee.

"Token of Friendship" is the theme for the week which will be highlighted by "Chocolate for Christmas" ceremonials to be held by each Y-Teen club at which every Y-Teen member will contribute one five cent chocolate bar to the package which will be sent to YWCA National headquarters in New York City before October 25 and from there to YWCA's in France, Germany, Japan, Korea, India and others in 65 lands abroad. These will be distributed to hungry children of all ages who yearn

for American friendship. Today there are more than 6,000 Y-Teen clubs throughout the United States and the national membership now numbers approximately 300,000.




