

Manufacturing Race

California Threatens New York For Title

Eastern industrial money being poured into Southern California since the end of the war has brought about a manufacturing growth that threatens to crowd New York from the number one spot.

This was the chord sounded by Lawrence Pritchard, Los Angeles bank executive, in a keynote address at the Harbor District Chambers of Commerce meeting held last Thursday evening in the Torrance Civic Auditorium.

Pritchard estimated that one billion dollars had been invested here by out of state industrialists. He pointed out that California is now second in total income and per capita income for the entire nation.

Last year one fifth of all the homes built in the U. S. were constructed in California.

Preceding the dinner meeting the group went on record as opposing the transfer of airplane manufacturing facilities to plants owned by the government. It was expressed that such moves were attempts to nationalize the aircraft industry under the guise of national security.

Ship transportation across the Isthmus of Tehuantepec in Mexico was backed by the representatives of the various Chambers of Commerce throughout the Harbor Area.

William W. Jones, of Lynwood, moderated at a discussion of contractual agreements between governmental agencies and Chambers of Commerce.

Greeting the guests was Torrance's favorite daughter, Rosemary DeCamp, start of screen, video and radio.

Reed Parkin, secretary-treasurer of Doak Aircraft Corporation, acted as Master of Ceremonies.

Bid of \$61,400 Wins Contract For School Unit

The bid to construct the Administrative Service Unit to serve the Torrance Unified School District was awarded by the Board of Education Tuesday night to the G. Iannini Construction Company on their low bid of \$61,400.

The one-story steel-stucco building will be located on school property of Flaza Del Amo north of the present temporary school headquarters.

The unit will house the district offices, library, bus transportation facilities, and meeting room for the Board of Education.

Nine bids for the construction job were received by the local board, ranging from Iannini's low bid to a high of \$76,066.

Christian School Planned For Riviera District

Construction of new quarters for the South Bay Community Christian School is expected to start early in January, 1950.

School Superintendent A. L. Trier announced yesterday. Site for the planned structure covers six blocks fronting on Highway 101 in the Hollywood Riviera district.

Now located in Redondo, the school has enrollment of 105 students. When construction of the new school is completed, facilities for twice the number of present students will be available Trier said.

The institution is non-denominational and is a California non-profit corporation, Trier declared.

The new school will contain eight classrooms, each 21 by 30 feet and will be staffed by five teachers.
