Playground**

Recommendations for the development of the "Fern Avenue Playground" into an all-inclusive modern recreational area were recently submitted to the Torrance City Council by the City Planning Commission, Secretary John Patrick announced.

Located between Greenwood and Fern avenues and ElDorado and Sonoma streets and covering an entire city block area of five to six acres, the site was recommended for acquisition from the school board in a commission action.

Superintendent of Schools Dr. J. Henrich Hull, although not officially advised of the commission's recommendation, intimated that the school system "needs a 10-acre school site more than we need the playground."




