**Grand Jury List Contained Names Of 3 Known Here**

Two local men and the wife of a theater owner here, were among the 120 candidates submitted for duty on the Los Angeles County Grand Jury for 1950.

Nominated for jury duty but eventually eliminated from the list were:

Lew W. Parrish, 1919 Andrew avenue, assistant director of public relations, Joint Council of Teamsters; Lawrence Harvey, vice-president of the Harvey Machine Company, and;

Mrs. Albert Mellinkoff, wife of the co-owner of the Stadium, Grand, and Torrance Theaters in Torrance.

The name of Mrs. Mellinkoff was eliminated from the list along with two others before the drawing of the names of 30 finalists. The action was challenged by a superior court judge. Reason for withdrawing Mrs. Mellinkoff's name was said to be that the prospective jurors might be unsympathetic to organized labor.

Parrish and Harvey were eliminated from serving when their names were not among the 30 finalists drawn from the adjusted pool of 117.
