Science Topic For Sunday To Be 'Mind'

"Mind" will be the subject of the Sunday Lesson-Sermon in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston. The Golden Text is from Isaiah: "The Lord is exalted; for he dwelleth on high; he hath filled Zion with judgment and righteousness. And wisdom and knowledge shall be the stability of thy times, and strength of salvation." Isaiah declares: "The Lord of hosts hath sworn, saying, Surely as I have thought, so shall it come to pass; and as I have purposed, so shall it stand: That I will break the Assyrian in my land, and upon my mountains tread him under foot; then shall his yoke depart from off them, and his burden depart from off their shoulders. This is the purpose that is purposed upon the whole earth: ... For the Lord of hosts hath purposed, and who shall disannul it? and his hand is stretched out, and who shall turn it back?" In "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," Mary Baker Eddy says, "Science reveals only one Mind, and this one shining by its own light and governing the universe, including man, in perfect harmony. . . . The divine Mind supports the sublimity, magnitude, and infinitude of spiritual creation."

The campaign, called "One Great Hour of Sharing," will culminate on Sunday, March 12, when the participating churches will take up offerings for their work with Displaced Persons, refugees, and general relief needs in Asia, the Middle East, and Europe.
