## Community Good Friday Services To Be Held at Civic Auditorium

A Union Good Friday Service sponsored by the Torrance Council of Churches beginning at 12 noon and continuing through the traditional three hours will be held at the Torrance Civic Auditorium. Alan Moore, former president of the council, will be in charge of the service. The speakers will each preach on one of the Seven Last Words which were uttered by Jesus Christ at the Crucifixion.

The Rev. Paul Wenske, pastor of the First Lutheran Church, will preach on the words "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do."

The Rev. C. M. Northrup, minister of the First Baptist Church will preach on the second of the Words "Vigily I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with Me in Paradise."

Torrance Herald:

To counteract any last minute rumors, we wish to clearly state our pledges, as follows:

We are unalterably opposed to ALL types of public gambling, not only the minor forms such as punch-boards, pin ball and marble games, but more importantly the major types of big-stake gambling practiced in public gambling halls, which are run and controlled by "big-town" gangsters. 
