'PAPFR' MISNOMER FOR FOLDING MONEY

Paper money, those crisp, green bills that tuck so neatly into your billfold, actually isn't paper money at all. It's cotton money.

Because paper money gets such wear and tear, it must be made of a material that can stand up under rough treatment and stay in good condition for a long time; therefore, cotton fiber is used in the manufacture of paper currency. Paper money in actual content is 75

per cent cotton fiber.

Cotton as paper is an old idea, for the earliest specimen of cotton paper dates back to 1050 A.D. Today cotton is a source of our finest writing paper because it makes a strong, quality paper that has assurance of extra strength and resistance to age and wear. It is used for top grade stationery, legal documents, and permanent records.

The New York Times prints a special edition each day on 100

per cent cotton fiber paper in order to keep a permanent record of each issue it publishes. Librarians and many other agencies who keep bound volumes of the Times subscribe to the permanent, cotton edition. Between 200 and 300 copies of the edition are printed each day after the regular newspapers are run off. Under normal use the cotton paper issue is expected to last for generations.


HOME AGAIN
