Scoffs at Alarmist View TV to Doom Conversation

Educators, psychologists and sociologists, who raise a hue and cry about the adverse effects of television on our habits, minds and culture are merely brewing a tempest in a TV-pot.

Writing on the subject of "What's Television going to do to Your Life," in House Beautiful magazine, Crosby asserts that the new medium's impact is not going to be anywhere nearly as devastating as was originally predicted.

The author quotes critics' forecasts that television will "destroy the art of conversation, terminate the publishing of books, ruin the motion-picture industry, and conceivably atrophy everyone's vocal chords."

Crosby concludes that, in the long run, the general culture level will be elevated, not depressed. On the question of eyesight, he admits that a dog in Connecticut got eyestrain from staring at television. But, he adds, "I suspect he had weak eyesight to begin with. Or else he didn't have much sense."
