Harbor Tech, El Camino to Open Metro Conference Play Saturday

El Camino and Harbor J.C.'s ball for Harbor, whereas El Camino has had four seasons under their belt.

The Warriors, coached by Amby Schindler, have a mixture of both power and speed. Returning lettermen on the line are plentiful. The backs have experience and speed.

Outstanding last year, and showing his versatility again this year, is left end Don Jurk. He's the spark on either offense or defense. Ray Carver, right end, and Dick Oefinger, left tackle, have also shown well this year.

In the backfield Don Young guides the fortunes of the Camino gridiron aggregation by calling the plays. He is the quarterback of a tight formation. At his disposal is a scabbard who could prove the thorn in Harbor's side, freshman Don Miller. He's fast, shifty, and a brilliant broken field runner. Fullback Ron Dixon is another speed burner. He has been hampered by a shoulder injury but should see action Saturday.

On the other side of the ledger Coach Joe Berry has his work cut out for him. Harbor has no returning lettermen. The players are strangers to each other. They have played only one game as a unit. Bikes Slated For Pretzel

Most important race for the Southern California motorcycle racers will be Sunday's 100-mile A.M.A. Western Championships over the new spectacular winding Road Race course at Carrell Speedway.

This will be the first time the big racing road bikes have tried Carrell's "pretzel," hailed as the toughest test for speed racing in the west.

All the A.M.A. "hot shots" will be on hand for the gruelling 100-mile marathon. The Road Race course at Carrell is one mile in length.

Early favorite is Jimmy Phillips, who won the 100-mile classic at Del Mar last fall. Then there is Bert Brundage, Bob Shirey, Chuck Basney, Don Hawley, and about 40 or so others.

Racing Director Bill White of Carrell says he expects a lot of top eastern drivers here for the event. Also a flock of star western drivers, who have been touring the east, are expected home for the Carrell 100-mile Western Championships.

This will be the first afternoon event of the fall season for the two-wheeled daredevils.

El Camino Tops Orange JC 13-7

With "Dancing" Don Miller leading the way, the El Camino College pigskinners swept by a favored Orange Coast eleven, 13 to 7, in a non-league fray held last Friday night in the new El Camino bowl. It was El Camino's second straight win in two starts.

Miller again displayed the breakaway running form he showed against the Alumni, and then some. "Dancing" Don was unstoppable, to say the least, as time after time he reeled off long gains. Two of his sprints set up both El Camino touchdowns, and his runback of an intercepted pass 51 yards was nullified because of a clipping penalty. Miller averaged 8.5 yards per carry.

Right-halfback Larry Willoughby galloped the final 15 yards around right-end behind three man interference. Jim Smith's placement knotted the count at 7-0.

Don Miller's 50-yard return of the ensuing kickoff to the Orange Coast 42-yard line was the spark of El Camino's final sustained drive. Seven running plays and two short pass completions by Quarterback Don Young nudged the mole-skin over the Pirate goal line in the opening seconds of the final quarter. Dick Turner spurted across from 2 yards out, but Turner's conversion attempt was blocked.

The visitors ran and passed the ball from their own 43-yard marker to the Warrior 12 in the final moments of play, and the scoring threat by intercepting an end zone pass and giving El Camino the ball on their own 20-yard line.

Outstanding players for El Camino, besides the aforementioned Don Miller, included Don Jurk, who played a superb game at left-end, and Gary Van Vliet who showed great work on pass defense. For the losers Sub-quarterback Fred Harris completed 7 of 20 passes for 134 yards, and Fullback Bob Berry ran like a

bull, being responsible for practically all of the 53 yards as team piled up in their running game.

The Caminotes rolled 251 yards both running and passing, while Orange Coast made 187. In first downs El Camino led 14 to 7.

El Camino's first score came after only two minutes of the opening period. The drive started when Gary Van Vliet intercepted Pirate Quarterback Orv Thredgill's pass on the Pirate 29-yard line. Don Miller's 13-yard dash featured the six play march which saw Ron Skrifoff plunge the final 8 yards. Dick Turner's conversion upped the count to 7-0, the margin which the Warriors took to the dressing room at halftime.


