Warriors Squeak By Harbor Tech

Coach Amby Schindler had but one word for the game his Warriors put up Saturday night against the rough-and-tough new Harbor Tech squad of footballers: "Whew!"

This all came about in a two-hour fracas on the Warrior gridiron at the El Camino institution of higher learning last Saturday when the Warriors were considered by most to be very lucky to squeak out of the game with the 12-7 score in their favor.

The vaunted Warriors—which are conceded to be as fine a bunch of football players as any jaycee coach could ask for—played like a YMCA-sponsored touch football team most of the evening.

To add to the confusion, whistle-happy officials kept the score keepers busy chalking up penalties throughout most of the game, especially in the last half of the contest.

Dick Turner, one of four Torrance boys on the squad, set up the first El Camino score when he intercepted a wild Seahawk pass in the first period. After several penalties had moved the ball back from the Seahawk 23-yard line to the 34, Quarterback Don Young heaved a long one to Don Miller good for 21 yards, then Gary Van Vliet smashed another eight yards, and Miller plunged over the remaining four yards to the payoff section of the field. Turner missed the PAT.

ANOTHER MISS
Late in the second quarter, Miller snagged another long heave from Quarterback Young and raced 20 yards to another TD for the Warriors. Turner's second attempt at a PAT was blocked, leaving his score for the evening at a big fat zero.

Joe Berry's Harbor Tech eleven nearly pulled the game out of the hat late in the third quarter when Joe Lingrey flipped a seven-yard pass to Fred Hilde in the end zone. But Hilde, usually a sticky-fingered pass catcher, dropped the ball. If caught, the score would have put the Seahawks ahead—perhaps would have led to a huge upset.

Harbor will meet Taft on their home field Friday night, while El Camino travels to San Diego for a game with the Knights.


