

Playgrounds to Open for Summer Next Monday

Plans for Opening Day Fetes Outlined by Area Supervisors

Summer will officially arrive at the city's playground areas and parks next Monday when supervisors of the various areas swing open the gates and unlock the playground equipment for the first day of a 10-week summer program.

Plans for gala opening day festivities have been announced by several playground directors.

Eddie Cole has announced that various contests and tests of skill will be staged at Fern Avenue playground where he will be the supervisor this summer.

Other supervisors include Bob Kingston at El Retiro; Charles Wallace at WALTERIA; Cliff Graybehl and Lynn Shidler at Seaside; Bill Stanley at Torrance Park; Ed Moghreblian at North

Torrance; and Rex Welch and Doris Avis at the high school. Most are planning special events to mark the opening day next Monday.

"First thing out of the bag, we want the kids to sign up for the Alondra Park Summer Swim program," Recreation Director Frank Carpenter said. Underwritten by the Kiwanis Club as the objective for their annual "Kids' Day" fete, the swim program will be free this year. Supervision will be furnished by the Recreation Department.

Parents who want to have their children participate in the swim program must register at the playground in their area, Carpenter said.

REASONS OUTLINED
Several reasons for having the parent register for the children were outlined by Carpenter. First, the Recreation Department and the Kiwanis Club want to be sure that the parents know their child is participating in the program.

Secondly, the registration will help the department plan the transportation. Last year the program cost each participant \$2.85. There will be no charge for the outing this year. Boys and girls between the ages of 6 and 12 can participate. The program will operate each Tuesday and Thursday from July 10.

A special teenage program will be conducted each day at the high school. The program there will include tennis, swimming, softball and other activities for teenagers.

Movies of the various activities on the city's playgrounds will be made throughout the summer, Carpenter said. By fall, it is hoped that the department will have about 1000 feet of color movie to be made available to service clubs and other groups.

Job Seekers Increase Here

Slight increases in the number of Torrance residents seeking employment through the local Department of Employment office were reported this week by Mrs. Winona Ellis, manager.

A total of 305 Torrance residents were signed up for work this week as compared to 336 a month ago, Mrs. Ellis reported.

Largest increase was noted in agricultural workers whose registrations increased from 19 to 42 during the past month. None were registered in April. Several declines were noted among them applicants for clerical, service, and skilled employment.
