

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Torrance YWCA to Seek 'Branch' Classification

When the Electoral Assembly of the Harbor Area YWCA is held on Thursday evening, June 28, at the San Pedro YWCA, a matter of much interest to Torrance YWCA members will be at stake. Bylaws for a new Torrance YWCA branch will be voted upon, deciding whether Torrance may move out of the limited "program center" classification into the more inclusive and responsible "branch classification."

The change has already been approved by the Torrance Committee and by the Harbor Area board of directors, who feel that the work the "Y" is already doing in Torrance and vicinity, and the occupancy of the handsome new "Y" building justify the constitutional change. When the new bylaws go into effect the Torrance YWCA Committee will be officially the Torrance Branch Committee on Administration, and members of that committee will be elected by ballot sent to all Torrance electoral members.

Mrs. Leonard Stamps, chairman of the Torrance Committee, hopes a large number of Torrance electors will attend the meeting on the 28th. "With our new building we will have greatly increased opportunities to serve our community. As members of a branch our members will have more voice in determining the best services for us to offer. It is important to the future of the YWCA in Torrance that the bylaws be given

final approval by the electors," she said.

Also part of the meeting on June 28 will be a report of the YWCA Regional Conference, to be held June 15-19 at Asilomar on the Monterey Peninsula. Torrance will be represented at the conference by Mrs. Stamps and by Mrs. Charlotte Lukes, YWCA program director.
