## Announce Plans to Televis Five El Camino Grid Games This Fall

Five El Camino Junior College grid games will be televised this fall as part of the program sponsored this year by the Hoffman Radio Corporation of televising 23 Western States and Metropolitan Conference games, it was announced last week.

Announcement of the decision to televise junior college football was made last week by H. L. Hoffman, president of the radio company. With the NCAA restricting the televising of major collegiate games, the company in cooperation with the commissioners of the two conferences agreed to put 23 of the jaysee games on the screen this fall.

Games will be released over KPITV (Channel 9).

Actually, it appears that Southern California TV owners will see more football than any other television area in the nation. The 23-game schedule is one of the longest offered anywhere, the twice-a-week scheduling will increase the audience potentiality, and many night games will permit day workers to see the games. The games will be telecast on Friday and Saturday nights, Hoffman said.
