**Resident Issues Warning About Ex-Hometown**

A Columbia Steel roll-turner who worked in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, steel mills for nearly 40 years before coming to Torrance seven years ago had a few unkind things to say about his former hometown when he returned from a vacation trip there this week.

"I just want to warn anyone who might be thinking of taking a trip there this summer," said W. A. "Bill" Lewis, of 720 Border avenue.

Bill was the victim of a "dip" while waiting for a bus to take him to New York. Cost of the encounter: \$52.

"Had to cancel my trip," he said.

Lewis explained it this way: I was standing in the depot with one of my sons who had come to see me off. I know my billfold was in my pocket just a second before. I shook hands with my son, reached for the billfold and found it was gone.

He wrote a letter to the Pittsburgh Press explaining the situation, and pointing out that several others had been victims of a pickpocket in the depot.

Mr. and Mrs. Lewis had been visiting relatives and friends in the Steel City. Mrs. Lewis remained to be with her sister who is critically ill, he said.

**Ordinary Cold Believed Cause of Tot's Death**

Resuscitator crews from the Torrance Fire Department lost a holiday battle July 4 in attempt to revive a three and a half month old baby girl who died of suffocation as the result of a cold.

The small victim was Tara Lee Beck, 3229 Raintree avenue, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Beck.

The child apparently suffocated during the night when liquids blocked its air passage. Captain N. T. Whitney and Fireman D. Davis fed the infant oxygen for 30 minutes in attempt to restore its breathing. Dr. Rodney A. Stetson pronounced the small baby dead after resuscitation methods failed.

Surviving also are a sister, Margaret Lynn Beck, the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. D. Bryant of Hawthorne; and the paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Beck, of Paradise, California.

Funeral services were held on July 7 in the Stone and Myers Chapel with Rev. Shuler Jr. of the Trinity Methodist Church of Los Angeles officiating. Interment in Inglewood Cemetery followed the last rites.

**Veteran Pilot Returns Home**

A tour of overseas duty which began last fall when he was sent overseas with the 452nd Bomb Wing ended recently for one Torrance flyer when he was returned to the United States after flying 70 missions and receiving the Distinguished Flying Cross.
