 a letter to the City Council this week.

Date for the election has been tentatively set at November 13.

Greatest need for improvement lies in the storage and distribution facilities, Stevens pointed out. He noted that many areas are served by feeder lines which are inadequate to maintain a flow of water considered necessary.

Much of the information on hand concerning the water system was gathered in a survey made by James Montgomery, widely known hydroengineer, which was completed last year. Montgomery recommended that the city's three existing water districts and those areas now served by the Metropolitan Water District be consolidated into one district. The eventual program is to tie the city together with adequate storage and feeder systems so the entire area can be served with the one water works system.

After considering the type of bond to be proposed, officials concluded that the general obligation issue which could be retired by revenues from the water would be the most equitable. A survey conducted by Montgomery found that a reasonable increase in water rates would pay off the bonds. The increased water rates would still compare favorably with the existing rates of other cities in the county, he reported.

 servation of this vital and strategic material.

"The United States is totally dependent on foreign sources for its supply of diamonds," the manufacturer said.

The appointment was made for an indefinite period, and is on a W.O.M. (without compensation) basis — therefore the Dollar-a-Year category. It is believed that Felker's is the first such appointment made to a Torrance resident.

Qualifying as the city's most traveled resident, Felker has completed four trips to Europe this year, and has made several trips between here and Washington, D. C., New York City and other Eastern cities.

Allen, who formerly operated another station here in Torrance, has taught in the Inglewood schools for three years. During World War II he was with the Air Transport Command for three years, serving


in the Asiatic Theater overseas.
