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# Murder Mystery Develops After Bullet Riddled Bedding Found

## Chemists Start Probe Of Blood Stained Bed

Bedding, bloody and bullet-riddled, and definitely smacking of homicide was discovered yesterday afternoon in the hills near the Torrance-Palos Verdes boundary. Police Chief John Stroh immediately summoned chemists from the sheriff's crime laboratory to start probing the blood stained sheets, pillow cases and ripped mattress.

Detective Sergeant Percy Bennett of the Torrance Police Department said two holes which he believes definitely to be bullet holes were found in the sheet and mattress. The mattress had an 18-inch triangular gash apparently made by someone attempting to recover the slugs which had been fired into the bedding.

**FRESH STAINS**  
"The stains are not older than 36 to 48 hours," Chief Stroh said.

The grim discovery was made by Ruby Malone, 109 17th avenue, Los Angeles, who reported her findings to the Palos Verdes Police Department. They in turn discovered the bloody bedding to have been ditched on the Torrance side of the line in a grove of trees in Hollywood Riviera.

An all-points teletype for any information regarding the mysterious findings was sent out immediately by the local police department.

**NO MARKS FOUND**  
No laundry marks were visible indicating the bedding may have come from a private home and not from a motel or other lodging place using commercial laundries.

Asked if they had any theories on the case, both Chief Stroh and Bennett indicated they had some "definite ideas," but declined to discuss them for fear of putting the investigation in jeopardy.

**Woman Falls Leaving City Bus at Terminal**  
Rushed to Harbor General Hospital last evening was a 70-year-old Los Angeles woman who fell while alighting from a Torrance bus at the Bus Depot on Cabrillo. Bus driver L. L. Crowther said Mrs. John Beck, who lives at 1107 North Avenue 51, appeared to fall when her "leg gave away" as she started to leave the bus. No report of her injuries was available at press time last night.

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## United Rubber Buys 16-Acre Industrial Site

Plans for the erection of a new multi-million dollar manufacturing plant here were disclosed this week with the announcement by Henry W. Creager, president of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, that the United Rubber Corporation had acquired approximately 16 acres at the intersection of Arlington avenue and Dominguez street.

Although company officials were reluctant to discuss plans for the new plant, it has been reported in trade circles that the new industry would specialize in the production of latex and would represent an investment in excess of \$2,000,000.

The company's expansion program is being planned in close cooperation with the National Production Authority and other federal agencies.

Purchase of the 16-acre industrial site was made by direct negotiation with Edward W. Christiansen, president of the Magnesium Corporation of America, in Chicago, Creager reported. The United Rubber Corporation is headed by Nathan Kaplan, president; Sam Kaplan, vice-president; and Paul A. Faber, secretary-treasurer.

The company decided to purchase the Torrance site on the basis of information supplied by Blaine Walker, executive secretary of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce. It was learned. The site adjoins the Pacific Electric Railway shops on Dominguez street and the American Rock Wool plant on Arlington avenue.

## French Attache Given Key to City by Mayor

"How clean your town is. And your lawns. . ." Thus did Pierre L. Massin, an attaché of the French Embassy in New York, comment on the City of Torrance at brief ceremonies Tuesday during which the French official and his pretty wife were presented a key to the city by Mayor Bob L. Haggard.

Having passed through many eastern towns on their way to the Pacific Coast, Monsieur Massin and his wife were impressed with number of freshly painted houses in Torrance as compared to what they saw in many parts of the east.

The Massins and their four-year-old son are the guests of Mr. and Mrs. B. T. Whitney whom the French couple met in China while Mr. Whitney was attached to the U. S. intelligence office during World War II.

## Lad's Cry Brings Dad To Rescue

Blond-headed, two-year-old Brent Sorkness missed drowning in a tar sump Sunday by a matter of seconds.

He was pulled to safety by his father, William Sorkness, 2017 West 233rd street, who heard him cry out as the boy's face started to sink beneath the surface of a small tar pit near 233rd street and Eshelman avenue.

The tot was taken by Figueroa and Miller ambulance to the Harbor General Hospital where attendants treated the small lad and removed his tarry robe. Much of the boy's hair had to be clipped. He was released Monday morning after spending a restless night at the hospital.

George Powell, assistant director of the city's civil defense program, reported that the owners of the property were unaware of the sump, but were taking steps to have the pit filled at once.

The small lad apparently became ensnared in the pit when he strolled across the surface, which was camouflaged by a thin layer of dust and leaves. When his father, a Union Oil Company employee, found him only half of his face was above the surface.

## REGISTER NEW PUPILS

Warren Hamilton, attendance supervisor, asked all parents of students who have never attended Torrance schools before to register their children today and tomorrow. Kindergarten students must be four years of age prior to March 1, 1951 to be eligible to enroll in kindergarten. New first grade students must be five years of age prior to that date to enroll. A new law raising this age will not go into effect until after school has opened.

Parents of new students may obtain additional information about attendance zones by phoning Hamilton, at the Board of Education offices, Torrance 2111.

In the Torrance system three new schools will be receiving pupils. To be open are the new Greenwood school which will house students in the 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grades, the El Nido Bungalow elementary school and the Bungalow school at Crenshaw north of 190th street.

## RECORD EXPECTED

Mrs. Arminda Bonwell, principal of the Halldale school in the Shoestring strip, is expecting a record enrollment of 800 students. Two classes, A1 and B2 will be on double sessions, she reports.

At Torrance High School Principal John Steinbaugh is expecting a record enrollment to approach the 1000 mark. Last year the enrollment was 800 pupils. 

## Driver in Train Wreck Arrested

To be sentenced October 2 on a drunk driving charge is Marvin Jones, 30, of Harbor City, driver of an auto which crashed into the side of a Santa Fe train Saturday evening at the Western avenue crossing near Sepulveda boulevard.

Although no one was seriously injured in the crash the heavy Saturday traffic was backed up on either side of the crossing. Newton Jones, who gave his address as 3455 Emerald street, was placed on a stretcher and hoisted between the coupled tank cars of the train to Figueroa and Miller's ambulance. Attendants at the Harbor General Hospital treated him for a bump on the forehead and a wrenched shoulder.

Also in the car was Eldon Barnes, 37, of the Emerald street address who was the legal and registered owner of the car. He was uninjured.

## Crenshaw to Be Closed During Widening, Paving
