## Tips on Canning Albacore Given by Health Officer

In the wake of one of the greatest runs of albacore and tuna the west coast has had in many seasons, together with increased shipments from Japan, Los Angeles County Health officials are this week answering a flood of requests for information on approved methods of canning these fish.

Housewives are buying tuna and albacore at a wholesale rate of about 25 cents per pound from a growing number of outlets throughout the county. All fish are sold in whole parts only and are purchased in quantities which usually necessitate canning or deep freeze storage.

### NON-ACID FOOD

Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, county health officer, points out that there is a right way and wrong way of canning fish, which unlike some other canned products, is a non-acid food.

All non-acid food such as fish should be canned only under steam pressure, the health officer said.

Technical information now being released by health department officials is based on a bulletin issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the University of California, which recommends that at sea level fish should be processed at ten pounds pressure for 110 minutes using containers not more than a pint in size.

For the first 1000 feet above sea level it is recommended that the pressure be increased by one pound and that it be raised a half a pound for each additional 1000 feet. Time need not be increased.

Dr. Gilbert points out that before eating home canned fish a further precaution of boiling it for 15 minutes could be observed.
