**How Much 'Bounce'?**

**Roaring Reception Given Jet Engines**

A new General Electric testing plant on Lomita boulevard is currently measuring the "bounce" that has been put back into jet engines after they have acquired that tired feeling in the stepped-up air operations over Korea.

The engines get a roaring examination here after they have been pepped up at the GE repair plant in Los Angeles. Then they are delivered for installation in fighter and bomber aircraft and go looking for MIGs. Whether or not the plant, which was recently put into operation is making a roaring hit with nearby residents, is still a matter for conjecture.

Some say that they can't hear a sound a-couple of blocks away from the plant. Others have complained the roar is audible in downtown Torrance, about two miles away.

Anyhow, two of the engines, which come in the 18-foot long economy size, are tested each week day at the plant. Placed on mounts inside a concrete stall, the jets start with a low rumble which increases in intensity to something of a shriek at half throttle. Then they roar merrily along at full

speed for about 20 minutes. Technicians check a maze of instruments in a small compartment above the stall to search for deficiencies. Worth something like \$50,000 apiece, the model J-47s are used in the Sabrejet fighting planes as well as in many other craft. The present two-a-day testing rate is expected to be doubled in the near future, plant officials said.

**STEEL INCOME FALLS**
