Tartars Lose 7-0 To Hawks

A 25-yard touchdown pass late in the third quarter was the only tally in the Torrance-Redondo game here Friday night when a packed stadium watched the Seahawks pull out a 7-0 win in the Bay League "tremender."

The outcome of the game didn't settle the Bay League championship by any means—Santa Monica took care of that several weeks ago. It probably did settle the third place spot in favor of Redondo, however.

Although the game will go in the books as a win for Redondo, the Tartars were far from convinced this week that they had been beaten.

COACH PLEASED

"For the first time this year, I didn't feel so bad about the loss," Coach Cliff Graybehl said. He explained that he was so proud of the brand of ball the Tartars played that he was sure the team would knock off Beverly Hills and Narbonne with ease.

Graybehl has special praise for junior Harry Bayless who played the entire game with a weak ankle. Bayless, was "around the corner" several times during the evening, but didn't have the power to break loose. He usually goes for a t.d. when he turns the corner.

BACKS SLAPPED

Others coming in for slaps on the back were linemen Harvey Rushfeldt, GeGe Johnson, and Bill Gray who threw back the Hawk drives time and again. Quarterback Bill Crawford had trouble with getting his punts away during the evening, but fans were thrilled early in the game when he got one away on his own 10-yard stripe that rolled dead on the Redondo 17—a total of 73 yards. It went 63 yards from the line of scrimmage. He had another punt partially blocked and one blocked which reduced his average to slightly more than 21 yards.

Statistically, the Tartars outshone the Seahawks in nearly every department. But like any other game, the payoff goes with the score.

Moose Arrange To Take Kids To Rams Game

The Loyal Order of Moose of Southern California and the Los Angeles Rams are joining hands to stage the second annual "Operation Football," with a goal of taking 35,000 boys and girls to the Rams-Lions game in the Coliseum on Sunday, December 9, George Powell, governor of the Torrance Lodge, announced this week.

Powell revealed that the lodge civic affairs committee of Merle Cooke, Louis Briganti, R. P. Pendleton, and Joe Platt is already making plans for the local fraternity to participate in this Southern California Moose activity. Arrangements have been made to transport the boys and girls by Torrance Municipal buses to the game.

Originated last year, "Operation Football" delivered over 5000 youngsters to the Coliseum for the game. This year, William John, business manager of the Rams, and John F. Carter, vice-president of the California Moose Association, have set a minimum goal of 35,000 young guests.

Based on a youth welfare idea, the "Operation Football" allows each Moose or other fraternal purchaser to take five youngsters between the ages of 8 and 14 to the game as guests with the purchase of a \$2 ticket. Tickets may be obtained from officers of the Moose and members of the civic affairs committee.

Two hundred or more children from this city are expected to board the Torrance buses at 12:30 p.m. in front of the Carson street Moose Lodge on Sunday, December 9—Destination: "Operation Football."

Redondo Beahawks Rout Torrance 33 to 0 in Bay League Contest

A fast moving, hard hitting Redondo Bee team pushed to a 33 to 0 victory over the Torrance Bees last Thursday on the victors' home grounds.

The Tarbees fought gamely to stop the Seahawks, but the Redondo squad pounded the After the kickoff by Redondo in the first quarter, the Torrance Tarbees were forced to punt on their fourth down. The kick was blocked, however, and the Beahawks took over on the Tarbees 35-yard line.

Pushing straight through center, the Beahawks went the distance for their first tally, and seven points. The Torrance offense couldn't seem to get started down the field and were again forced to punt. The Tarbees' line held the Beahawks for the remainder of the quarter, but as the first frame ended the Redondo squad held a seven point lead.

ALL THE WAY
Torrance kicked the Redondo 30-yard line as the second quarter opened, and on the next play, the Beahawks went all the way for their second touchdown and another seven points.

After two completed passes the Tarbees were again forced to punt. The ball sailed to Redondo's 32-yard line where the ball was dropped and several Torrance men quickly smothered it. The recovery gave Torrance a first down deep in Redondo. Buddie Powers flipped a 12 yard pass to Don Atkins who was dropped on the Beahawks' 35-yard line. The Tarbees fumbled on the next play, however, and Redondo recovered the ball to end the Torrance threat.

Two plays later the Redondo Beahawks racked up their third touchdown on two consecutive off-tackle plays for a total of 78 yards.

27-0 AT HALF

After an exchange of punts, Redondo intercepted a Tarbee pass on the local's 40-yard line, and pushed to their fourth touchdown as the first half ended, with the score standing 27 to 0.

The third quarter slipped by as the rivals were unable to march downfield. But with two minutes remaining in the pe-


