Just as expected, Santa Monica's unbroken Vikings dominated the selection of the 1951 All-Bay league football team.

But rather unexpectedly, Torrance failed to place a man on the first string. However, the Tartars landed three men on the second string and four other Torrance gridgers were given honorable mention.

The three Torrance men placed on the second team were tackle Cal Browning, tackle Go-Go Johnson, and end Jack O'Call. All are seniors. O'Call shared his end berth with Leuzinger's Ray Quintana as a result of a tie in the voting.

Honorable mention went to guard Bill Gray, and backs Bill Crawford, Harry Bayliss, and Beryl Jones. Gray, a second-team pick last year, was handicapped with injuries part of the year. Bayliss and Jones have another year of eligibility.

Two Santa Monicans, quarterback Sandy Lederman, who appears a cinch all-CIF choice, and end A. D. Williams were unanimous choices.

Two Repeaters

Fullback Jim Carmichael of Inglewood, younger brother of SC halfback Al Carmichael, and Williams were the only repeaters from last year's All-Bay club.

Five Santa Monicans, three Inglewood men, three Redondo Seahawks, and one Beverly Hills man made up the first team.

A tie in the voting between Don Swearington of Redondo and Ernie Neal of Samohi for the right half spot brought about the addition of a twelfth man to the squad.

Williams and R. C. Owens of Samohi at ends, Tracy Saylor of the Vikings and Harlan Geach of Redondo at tackles, Stan Swanson of Inglewood and Mike Glick of Beverly Hills at guards, and center Glenn Finley of Redondo made up the line of the All-Bay team.

The backfield found Lederman at quarter, Don Cornell of Inglewood at left half, Swearington or Neal at right half, and Carmichael of the Sentinels at full.

Knox Moves Up

The second team was featured by the Bay league's wandering minstrel, Ronnie Knox, most recently of Inglewood, at quarter. Knox began his Bay league footballing at Beverly Hills last year, and as a sophomore was given honorable mention. This past season he traded the Norman uniform for an Inglewood suit, and wound up on the second string. It is now rumored that Knox will swap the Sentinel garb for the colors of Santa Monica in a quest to make the Bay loop first team in his senior year.

Others in the second backfield include left half Bill Epler of Beverly Hills, right half Millard Paxton of Samohi, and a tie between Inglewood's Dick Tiberio and Samohi's Game Baiz. The Bay league team is based on all-opponent teams selected by each loop member.

Tipoff for the preliminary Bee game tomorrow will be 3 p.m. in the Torrance gym.

Drawings for the Wilson tournament have not yet been made. Tartar Coach Rex Welch said yesterday. He expects to find out who Torrance's first-round opponent will be by Monday.

A glance at the tourney entry list shows that the affair will be loaded, but good. Included in the list of competing teams are Compton, defending CIF titalist; Pomona, Citrus Belt league champs of the 1951 season; Chaffey, CBL runner-up last year; St. Anthony's, Jordan, Poly, and Wilson, all of Long Beach; Excelsior; Monrovia; Oxnard; Notre Dame; Leuzinger, Redondo and Montebello.

A consolation as well as a championship round will be played. First tournament game is scheduled for Wednesday at 12:30 in the afternoon at Wilson gym, 7th and Ximeno, in

Long Beach. Tuesday the Tartars took their second jaunt of the year to Long Beach, and just like the first time, it proved to be an unhappy one. This time the Tartars met Long Beach Jordan, and came back on the short end of a 59-40 count. The Tarbes also took it on the chin, 38-32.

High man for the Tartars was Bob Moon, with 9. Jack O'Call and Guy Farrington each added seven.

Last Friday the Tartars lost their home debut to Lynwood, as the Knights forged ahead in the second half to win, 40-37. Center Farrington was the point leader in this one, tossing in 14. Lynwood's B team took the opener, 33-25.
