
Two Torrance Soldiers on Island Duty

Two Torrance soldiers have been relieved of combat duty in Korea, and with their unit, the 1st Cavalry Division, have been assigned to security duty on Hokkaido, Japan's northernmost island, the Army announced this week.

Making the move were Cpl. Robert Pimentel, of 18824 Prairie avenue, a squad leader in Company E, 5th Cavalry Regiment; and Pfc. Jimmie T. Sims, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bartlett Sims, 21250 S. Main street. Sims is a rifleman in Company C, 7th Cavalry Regiment.

Both men have been awarded the Combat Infantryman Badge and the Korean Service Ribbon with one campaign star. Pimentel arrived in Korea on June 8, 1951, and Sims on October 7, 1951.

The 1st Cavalry Division was the second U. S. division to enter the Korean fighting, making an unopposed amphibious landing at Pohang-dong in July, 1950.

Formosa Bound Minister Leaves Tomorrow Eve To Teach Gospel of John

Torrance's trumpet-playing minister, the Rev. J. R. Killman, 39-year-old assistant pastor at the First Baptist Church, has his bags all packed, and tomorrow night leaves from International Airport for a two-month stay in Formosa.

There he will preach the Gospel of St. John to the island's regular inhabitants, and the Chinese Nationals — with emphasis on the young people. Letters from Governor Cast Wood will introduce him to school principals throughout the land, where he will assemble with children and tell them of Christianity.

"There is a spiritual vacuum in Formosa," Mr. Killman said. "If Christianity doesn't fill it, Communism will." This is his reason for going to the Far Eastern island.

Sponsored by the Youth for Christ movement, the preaching tour has been authorized by island officials, and by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek. He will speak to those in troop camps of Free China.

Teachings will be in the Gospel of St. John because that is the only gospel that has been translated into the language of the people, Mr. Killman explained. He will travel with an interpreter.

The entire mission was financed by the congregation of the

Torrance Baptist Church and local merchants. During his absence, student Douglas Jeffrey will provide the music for the Sunday services.

Mr. Killman will fly via Philippine Airlines, and will stop at Honolulu, Guam, Wake and Manila on the 41-hour journey. He will return through Okinawa, then to the mainland at Seattle.

At present, he said, there are about 600,000 Chinese Nationalist troops and 2,000,000 refugees from the Chinese mainland on the island, in addition to several million regular inhabitants.

He will be one of five Youth for Christ ministers on the island.


