## Water Injection Wells Started In West Basin

What officials believe to be an underground water way or artery carrying almost pure salt water from the sea into the West Basin was found this week by drillers who are sinking two test wells in the Manhattan Beach-Hermosa area.

Officials of the West Basin Water Assn. said this week that the wells were down a little more than 300 feet and that they are forerunners of several 12-inch and 18-inch wells for water injection into the basin. The work is being done to halt the intrusion of sea water into the basin.

At the same time, officials reported that the petitions for the annexation of the Dominguez territory to the West Basin were being delayed until boundary descriptions could be completed.

It will take 455 good signatures of registered voters in the area to validate the petition when it is circulated.

A letter from a prisoner-of-war who had been on the missing list since the second month of the Korean war brought joy to the family of Pfc. Danny Arellano this week. The letter, written on Christmas eve, was sent to his mother, Mrs. Jos. Arellano, 3162 Emerald St. through the War Department from the Chinese People's Committee. The letter read: "As I'm sitting here, I'm watching the rest of the guys in my squad who don't have to suffer the wounds, out trouble, some sit and think awhile. They all have that same sad look. It's always that way when a man thinks of home. I keep thinking what if another war should break out and Angel (a 14-year old brother) should have to go fight. I just pray to God that he does not have to suffer the wounds, deaths and destruction that war brings—alive one day and dead the next."


