Arthur A. Andersen Named V-P of Rome Cable Corp.

Appointment of Arthur A. Andersen, general manager of the Rome Cable Corp. plant here, as vice-president of the company, was revealed yesterday by A. D. Ross Fraser, president of the firm.

"Andersen will continue as general manager of the company's Torrance plant, manufacturing thin-wall and rigid steel electrical conduit," Fraser announced.

Born in Minneapolis, Minn., Andersen has been active in the manufacture of steel tube products for many years. In 1925, in partnership with Ernest Carlson, he started the Automatic Screw Machine Co. in the Southland.

In 1946 the Andersen-Carlson Manufacturing Co. began manufacturing metallic tubing at the plant's present location at 1739 W. 213th St. in Torrance.

The Rome Cable Corp. purchased the Andersen-Carlson facilities here in 1950 and Andersen has continued as the general manager of the plant since its sale.
