'Let's Use the Field,' Recreation Boss Says

Use of the Torrance Municipal Park by teams of the National Niteball League for fifteen nightly games during a coming two and one-half month period will be investigated by the City Council, it was revealed Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the city fathers.

Tom Babbitt, former member of the City Recreation Commission, asked the council dads to look into the use of the field by an "outside" group—Dow Chemical, which, though playing under a Torrance name, is not a Torrance firm.

Babbitt stated that he felt the use of park facilities this summer by local groups would be handicapped because the diamond had been signed to the National Niteball squads.

Ice Won't Stop Crowley Anglers

Although there is still 12 to 14 inches of ice at spots surrounding Crowley Lake, the consensus of those in the Eastern High Sierra is that the huge man-made reservoir's 1952 fishing season will get off to a bang on May 3.

Operated by the Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks, the giant fish arena is slated to draw more than 4000 anglers and 1500 boats for its opening week-end.

Record catch on the lake is a 19-pound 5-ounce Loch Leven, landed in 1950 by an El Monte sportsman.

George Marks, parks department manager, reminds anglers that private boats are allowed on Crowley provided they meet safety standards as established by the department.

No member of the Recreation Commission was present at the meeting to answer the complaints.

Superintendent of Recreation Frank Carpenter yesterday told the Herald that Dow was given use of the park because he felt that maximum use should be gained from all city facilities.

Latest fishing report news with catches of oyal eye perch, cabezone and sculpin. Good bass fishing in May.

Live Bait—Anchovies plentiful along with a few sardines.

San Clemente Island—Bass fishing very good now with more and more bull bass coming in. Barracuda and yellowtail are all around the island but won't take bait.

Catalina Island—Barracuda and white sea bass fishing improving steadily but catches still are not large. Five more giant black sea bass hook-ups taken last week but all were lost.

Santa Barbara Island—Producing near limits of bass and bottom fish. Anglers should bring along their heavy outfits as this fishing ground is noted for its giant black bass.

Local Banks—The first white sea bass of the season caught in local waters was brought in last week. Halibut biting very well and very steady at present along with good and fair catches of whitefish, sand bass and sculpin. No barracuda as yet.

Live Bait Barges—Halibut fishing holding up well. Fishing from Federal Breakwater (in skiffs)—Good as usual
