


New Starting Dates for Old-Age Benefit Payments Explained

The new starting date for figuring old-age and survivors insurance benefit payments is important to everyone now employed or self-employed in work covered by social security. In explanation of this statement, J. G. Bretherton, manager of the Long Beach Social Security office, points out that only work after 1950 can be used for figuring the amount of the benefit payment.

Everyone who has been in work covered by social security continuously since January 1, 1951, will be fully insured by the middle of the present year. If he reaches age 65 and decides to retire, he will be eligible for old-age benefit payments; if he should die after a year and a half of covered work after 1950, his survivors can get benefit payments. He and his family will have this insurance protection until July 1954. They will continue to have this protection if he stays in covered work for at least one-half the time after 1950 and up to the time of retirement at age of 65 or later, or up to the time of his death. Bretherton advises everyone who plans to retire during 1952 to visit the Long Beach Social Security office before making a decision. He points out that an employed person will not immediately get the highest benefit payments if he files his claim during 1952. Moreover, he says, "self-employment earnings for the year in which a claim is filed are not used to figure the amount of the payments. It may be to the advantage of both the employed and self-employed insured person to defer filing a claim until January 1953."

TORRANCE HERALD ORDINANCE NO. 107
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A PORTION OF CRESHAW BOULEVARD WITHIN THE CITY OF TORRANCE, AS A PART OF THE COUNTY SYSTEM OF HIGHWAYS AND CONSENTING TO THE IMPROVEMENT THEREOF BY THE COUNTY.

WHEREAS, by reason of its location and travel thereon the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County did, on the 15th day of April, 1952, adopt a resolution declaring that Creshaw Boulevard, from a point lying 1165 feet southerly of Lomita Boulevard to Pacific Coast Highway, in the City of Torrance, should be a part of the system of county highways in said County; and

WHEREAS, it is the purpose of said Board of Supervisors to improve and maintain said street; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Torrance is of the opinion that such improvement and maintenance by the County would be of great benefit to the citizens of the City of Torrance;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED that the City Council of the City of Torrance does hereby approve of the action taken by the County Board of Supervisors and consents to the improvement of said street by the County of Los Angeles.

This Ordinance is hereby declared an urgency measure necessary to the general welfare of the citizens of the City of Torrance as a whole, and shall go into immediate effect and shall be published once in the Torrance Herald, a semi-weekly newspaper published in the City of Torrance, and said Ordinance is hereby designated for that purpose, introduced, approved, adopted, and passed this 13th day of May, 1952.
