


BROTHERHOOD of MEN

She said the dormitory, originally planned for British girls alone, now houses women of over 30 different nationalities.

Miss Begg, now with the YW in New Zealand, has been in the U. S. for the past few months. During her talk she spoke of her ten years of service in India, Burma and Ceylon, and told of establishing rest camps and canteens during the war for servicewomen in the Far East and Africa.
