

Open to high school students as well as all adults, the classes will start June 24 and continue

for six weeks. Meetings will be held Tuesday and Wednesday evenings until rehearsals begin on a three-act play planned for the end of the course.

Desmond said that he has selected "Our Town," a Pulitzer prize winner by Thornton Wilder, because it offers wide opportunity for learning acting,

directing and stage production. High school students who meet certain qualifications will receive five credits towards graduation requirements, he said.

### Retired Sailor Finds New Life at College

They say, "Old soldiers never die," but Joseph Gadden, student at El Camino College, seems to be living proof that old sailors do all right for themselves too, when they find new directions for their energies and abilities.

Gadden, now crowding 55, is enrolled for 20 hours weekly study on the local campus. which is, in itself, no mean feat since the average load for a new student is 16 semester hours of study.

In addition, the former member of Coast Guard Intelligence, now retired, has found what was but an idle interest in art has developed into a realization of hidden talent in that direction.

Starting out in El Camino College as a pastime, Gadden quickly found his interest in learning new things went beyond a recreational interest, and skills of which he was unaware were developed in his college curriculum.

The retired Coast Guardsman has introduced some new wrinkles of his own in the manufacture of ceramics, one of his major fields of interest. Some of his color combinations and molding methods are achieved by means unknown to his curious classmates. Gadden hints that his secrets lie in the use of hot water bottles and sewing machines, but is reluctant to go further in describing his own processes.

In addition to ceramics, the old sailor is studying chemistry, mathematics, psychology, Spanish, English, and drawing and painting. He admits he was hesitant about starting in to school again with the "kids," but adds that he is glad he did. Gadden is so completely sold on the idea of education for those beyond the usual college age, he has, he says, persuaded four of his friends to retry their wings and go to school again.

El Camino College does not limit its enrollment to high school graduates who are working for an associate in arts degree, but has been encouraging all in the college district who are over 18 and feel they can benefit from the instruction to enroll. For such adult students, the college has no minimum requirements on previous schooling.

The enrollment now includes students from 16 to 78, according to a census of students recently taken. Classes are offered both in day sessions and extended day (evening) classes.

Gadden admits the college has given him a new outlook on life, and a new opportunity to redirect his energies for the years ahead.

### "The Flame" To Be Shown Here Tomorrow

"The Flame," Dr. Bob Pierce's new all-color sound documentary narrative of Korea at war, will be shown at the First Baptist Church, Manuel and Carson, at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow.

Filmed in the heart of Korean fighting, the missionary classic has been reported as one of the outstanding documentary records of all time.

Often called "America's missionary statesman to the Orient," Dr. Pierce is president of World Vision, Inc., producers of the film.

His film shows fleeing refugees, ruined cities, crippled orphans, front-line fighting, heavy artillery barrages, Communist prisoners of war, and in any other graphic portrayals of the Korea of today.

Admission to the showing is free. A freewill offering will be taken after the picture, for the world-wide missionary effort of World Vision, Inc.


