Shidler Expresses Appreciation For Services of City Judges

Judge John A. Shidler, candidate for Office No. 1, South Bay Municipal Court in the June Primaries, today publicly expressed his appreciation for their past services to the six city judges who will go out of office next January.

"During the past eleven years that I have been a judge in this area," Judge Shidler stated, "whenever an emergency arose, such as illness or death in the family, or military service, these judges have assumed one another's tasks quickly and quietly so that the Courts of the area never ceased to function."

"Since the people voted to reduce the courts in the area from seven part-time judges to two full-time Municipal Judges to take office next January, it means that five of these Judges necessarily must give up their judicial offices. Most of these men have devoted many years of their lives to this specialized service," Judge Shidler continued.

"Judge Sam Austin of Redondo, Judge Elmer Morris of Gardena and Judge Harry Sturges of Palos Verdes Estates elected to give up judicial work and did not file as candidates for one of the two Municipal offices.

"Judges Bridge of Hermosa, Higgins of Manhattan, and Willett of Torrance decided to try to continue their judicial careers and the voters will select one of these three on primary day, as they are candidates for Office No. 2.

"In Torrance, the residents know the full measure of Judge Willett's contributions to the community as an upright judge and citizen.

"Hermosa Beach, Judge Bridge has been an integral part of that city for more than twenty-seven years, serving on the school board as well as being the city judge.

"Manhattan Beach's Judge Higgins was City Prosecutor there many years until the death of City Judge Downing, when the former was appointed to take Judge Downing's place. For the past several years Judge Higgins has served the Los Angeles Courts as a pro tem judge.

"That the South Bay area must lose two of these experienced judges is regrettable," Judge Shidler stated. "However, we hope that the two losers will remain in their communities and serve here as lawyers, as they have in the past.

"Because of the vast increase of population here, a need for a third judge is already present. Within two years another Municipal Judge will be required. We may hope that the Governor, who has the power to appoint, will select one of the ex-judges when the legislature decides to add those offices," Shidler continued.

"The six City Judges whose names appeared above have helped me as your Justice of the Peace on many occasions, and I have helped them. They have served on many committees to advance the cause of good judicial service to this area. I wish to thank them for their professional unselfishness. I note their leaving the judiciary with considerable sorrow.

"I also wish to thank them for their expressions of confidence in me as a judge. Each of them chose not to oppose me, for professional reasons. Each knew that I have never campaigned on donated funds and that I would present my candidacy to the voters on a modest scale. That all of these judges chose to give up their profession rather than ask the voters to remove me from office was a great compliment."

Judge Shidler, Veteran of World War II, area resident for 29 years, father of four, school board president, has served here eleven years as judge. He seeks the support of those citizens who approve his impartial, efficient, and dignified conduct in office.
