## Civic Auditorium Rules Governing Use of City Facility Outlined By Official

Planning a political rally? A cooking school? Or a barn dance?

If you or your organization are planning to stage any such shindig in the Torrance Civic Auditorium there are a few "can do's" and "cannot do's" which must be observed, according to Frank Carpenter, director of recreation.

"Program chairmen might be interested in these rules and regulations concerning use of the auditorium," says Carpenter. Here they are:

**PURPOSES FOR WHICH AUDITORIUM MAY BE USED:**

- Meetings and activities of a literary, scientific, recreational, educational, political, economic, artistic, character-building and welfare nature, which are of general public interest to the citizens of the Torrance area.

**PROHIBITED USE:**

- Facilities may not be used for religious and sectarian purposes that may be contrary to the ordinances of the City of Torrance.
- Facilities may not be used by an individual, group or organization which has as one of its objects the overthrow of the government by force, or other unlawful means, or by an individual, group or organization deemed subversive, as defined in the State of California Code.

**APPLICATION FOR USE OF THE AUDITORIUM:**

- All requests for use of the Civic Auditorium shall be made in writing, on a form provided, and signed by a responsible officer or member of the group or organization. All such requests shall be submitted at least one week in advance unless deemed to be of an emergency nature by the City Manager.
- Scheduling will be done in the order in which applications are filed, except that any permit may be subject to cancellation, if the facilities are needed for city purposes, or in any event by action of the City Council.

**GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS:**

These rules apply to all individuals, groups and organizations not connected with the city, or sponsored by it.

- Sunday and holiday use of the auditorium shall be prohibited, unless special permission is granted by the City Council. All functions shall be expected to close not later than 12:00 midnight. Allowances may be made in unusual circumstances.
- Applications for stage use that involves the possibility of damage to city property may be denied. In any event, the person or persons signing the application shall be liable for any damages resulting from such use.
- Any changing of stage equipment, or furniture of the auditorium, is not permitted, except with the permission and supervision of the custodian in charge.
- No intoxicants or narcotics shall be permitted on the premises. Neither shall profane language, gambling, quarreling or fighting be tolerated.
- If the use of the kitchen equipment or dishes is involved, the kitchen and equipment must be 1 ft clean and ready for use the next day. The usual charge for this extra service will be charged.

**AUDITORIUM FEE SCHEDULE**

**GROUP I—Benefits**  
 Any program sponsored by an individual or organization for the benefit of an individual or group:  
 Fee: Auditorium, \$25; Public address system, \$10; Kitchen, \$10.

**GROUP II—Commercial Enterprises**  
 Any program sponsored by an individual, firm, club and organization for advertising or fund-raising purposes.  
 Fee: Auditorium, \$35; Public address system, \$10; Kitchen, \$15.

**GROUP III—Public Programs**

- Free to public: Any lecture, amusement or entertainment sponsored by an individual, club or organization.  
 Fee: Auditorium, \$15; Public address system, \$10; Kitchen, \$10.
- Haying admission or collection: Any lecture, amusement or entertainment sponsored by an individual, club or organization.  
 Fee: Auditorium, \$25; public address system, \$10; kitchen, \$10.
- Sponsored by private agencies, public address system, \$15; public address, \$5; kitchen, \$10.
- Sponsored by Torrance organizations or clubs:  
 Fee: Auditorium, \$25; public address system, \$10; kitchen, \$10.

**GROUP IV—Recreation Programs (Open to Public)**

- Sponsored by the City Recreation Department.  
 Fee: None.
- Sponsored by Torrance Unified School District.  
 Fee: Auditorium, \$10; public address system, \$5; kitchen, \$10.
- Sponsored by private agencies, public address system, \$15; public address, \$5; kitchen, \$10.
- Sponsored by Torrance organizations or clubs:  
 Fee: Auditorium, \$25; public address system, \$10; kitchen, \$10.

**GROUP V—Miscellaneous Groups:**

- Any individual or group whose purpose or affiliation does not automatically place them in any of the above classifications, will be charged a fee ranging from the minimum to the maximum, depending on the facilities needed and the purpose of the use.  
 P. E. E: Auditorium, \$10-\$35; public address, \$5-\$15; Kitchen, \$5-\$15.
