Realtor Offers Torrance Blvd. Zone 'Solution'

Gerald W. Alter, local realtor, recommended to the City Planning Commission last week the rezoning of the south side of Torrance Blvd. between Maddix Ave. and Crenshaw Blvd. to a limited C-1 zone, in order to end the controversy on the extension of the Asencia Medical Center now under way there.

Alter suggested that the zone would be the same as regular C-1, commercial, with the exception that not more than 50 percent of the area of any lot can be improved with buildings, allowing the remaining space to be used for auto parking.

Limited C-1 zoning might put an end to the medical center problem and be the cure for future parking problems, Alter said.

The recommendation was filed as a matter of record.
