HORSES TO SHINE AT BENEFIT SHOW THIS SATURDAY

Big event of the benefit program for the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra will gallop into the Portuguese Bend Riding Club show ring Saturday morning Aug. 23, as the second annual horse show gets underway. The show follows a "Box Stall Social" held in the club courtyard last Saturday as a kick-off feature for the nucleus of the charity program. A 16-event program exclusively for riders 18 years of age and under, the horse show will begin at 10 a.m. It is open to the public.
