Request of Metropolitan Water District showing tax levy of 28 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation read to Council by City Clerk A. H. Bartlett.

Report of the Torrance Unified School District that the district was not concerned that it should alter its policy and grant additional financing of the city's recreation program was sent to the Recreation Commission.

Request of Schultz and Peckham Ford for an approach to their business through the recently installed center parking areas referred to the traffic committee.

Request of the Torrance Area Youth Band for land on which to plan and build a music building denied, with the councilmen expressing the opinion that the city would be setting a bad precedent by giving away land to which it holds title.

Council Briefs

At a meeting of the Torrance City Council held at the City Hall Tuesday evening, Aug. 26, following items of business were handled:

Minutes of the meeting of Aug. 12 were amended to show that the appointment of Mark Wright to the Civil Service Commission is for the unexpired term of Everett Rowan, which runs until Jan. 15, 1957, and that he was appointed to both boards.

Request of Chief of Police John Stroh for a waiver of the one-year residence requirement for the next examination of police officers approved with the condition that the applicant be a resident of Torrance for not less than 90 days or be a qualified voter in Torrance.

Final budget for the year 1952-53 submitted by City Manager George Stevens approved.

Schedule for advertising, receiving bids, and awarding contracts for construction program in Water District No. 3 approved.

Recommendation of City Manager Stevens that Atty. Donald Armstrong be paid \$880 in legal fees in connection with the settling of water bond formalities approved.

Payment of \$3150 to Willard B. Guimont for a purchase of radio equipment for Civil Defense approved. Seventy-five per cent of the cost will be refunded by state and federal governments.

An appropriation of 2342.08 to Traffic Engineering, City of Los Angeles, for the operation and maintenance of traffic signals on Western Ave. in accordance with an agreement between the two cities approved.

Contract between the city and the Torrance Herald for legal advertising for the period July 1, 1952 to June 30, 1953 approved at the same rates paid under last year's contract.

Recommendation by the Planning Commission that the requirement of a front yard setback be waived in the case of Joel Whitman on property at 637 Border Ave. because of the irregularity of the lot approved.

Approved recommendation of Planning Commission that J. A. Prenevost be permitted to build an apartment over the garage at the rear of his dwelling at 2317 Torrance Blvd. with 584 square feet of floor area.

An amendment to the subdivision ordinance requiring all subdividers and developers to plant one tree, of a type suitable and approved by the Park Department, on each subdivided lot and to maintain the trees until all lots in the subdivision are sold was approved on the recommendation of the Planning Commission.

Request of the Lutheran Church of the Resurrection to operate a Christian Day School in the 300 block of Palos Verdes Blvd. approved with the assurance from the Planning Commission that churches and church schools are permitted in the location which is an R-3 zone.

Resolution 2306 adopted authorizing signing of grant deed for right-of-way purposes to the state of a portion of McMaster Park on 174th St.

Resolution 2307 adopted authorizing acceptance of grant deed from A. Lansdale for three lots at 190th St. and Crenshaw Blvd. to be used for a recreation area.

Resolution 2308 changing the names of several Torrance streets to make them conform to existing streets adopted.

Ordinance 613 — a new Land Use Plan — was held up at its second and final reading on the recommendation of Councilman Nick Drale for a legal opinion on a suggested provision.

WSB Approves National Supply Wage Contracts

Notice that the wage contract negotiated between the Torrance plant of the National Supply Co. and the Oil Workers International had been approved, was received this week by Works Manager John D. Spalding.

The new contract, approved by the 12th Regional Wage Stabilization Board, provides for a retroactive increase of 7 cents an hour on all hourly rated classifications beginning Jan. 14, 1952.

Also granted was a general increase of 7 1/2 per cent, averaging 12 1/2 cents per hour. The increase became effective June 2, 1952 and will be reflected in tomorrow's pay checks.

New shift premiums of 6 cents an hour for the swing shift and 9 cents for the graveyard shift were approved, Spalding was notified.

The 7 cents per hour retroactive pay has been paid to all hourly rated employees and the new rates are now in effect for the more than 1200 employees in the classifications covered, according to Spalding.

Announcement regarding general salary increases and retroactive pay for the more than 500 non-exempt and exempt salaried personnel is expected shortly.
