

As officials of the Torrance YMCA made preliminary plans for transporting an expected 100 or more boys to the 20th Annual Y-Day in Hollywood program Oct. 18, executive secretary Stan Roberts announced that local youths will enter an essay contest in connection with the event.

"Y" members will be encouraged to write essays of not more than 100 words on "Why I Like My YMCA." Entries will be judged in Hollywood and the winner's composition will be read by a movie star during the Hollywood Bowl variety show, which will be broadcast coast to coast.

Sheriff's deputies said the girl left home following a reprimand by her stepmother for a childish prank. The mother went to the store and when the girl's father, Gene McJunkin, returned a half hour later, the girl was gone.

Deputies found her Sunday afternoon near a partially completed house at 146th St. and Denker Ave., where she told them she had spent the night.

Torrance police made the search on Sharynne Lane at the request of deputies who reported that a girl answering her description had inquired about taxi fare to that area Sunday.

The girl was returned to her home.
