

### Congressman King Appeals To All Citizens to Vote

Representative Cecil R. King, 17th Congressional District, today appealed to all eligible citizens to register and vote in the coming election.

The veteran legislator praised the work of citizen groups and service organizations in the Torrance area and throughout the district who are volunteering their time and efforts to get every eligible person registered before the September 11 deadline.

Congressman King recalled that "even though the June primary election in California saw the largest primary vote in the state's history, with nearly 68 per cent voting, there still were 1,731,609 registered voters in the state who did not cast their ballot."

In 1948 "at least 21,000,000 potential voters were unregistered, and therefore disenfranchised, and in that election only a little more than half of the eligible voters in the United States bothered to cast a vote for President," King pointed out.

"It is a sad commentary on representative government when such a great percentage of the nation's potential voting power remains dormant," King stated.
