NEW BISHOP ASSIGNED TO METHODIST CHURCH

Appointment of Bishop Gerald Kennedy to the Los Angeles area for the Methodist Church was announced to the congregation of the First Methodist Church of Torrance by Rev. John Taylor Sunday morning.

The youngest bishop in the church, Bishop Kennedy was assigned to the area at the jurisdictional conference held in Santa Barbara recently.

He was made a bishop four years ago at Portland, Ore., after a six-year pastorate at Lincoln, Neb.

The area's new bishop is a native of Michigan and was graduated from the College of Pacific in 1929. He was ordained to the Methodist ministry in 1932, received his doctorate from Hartford Theological Seminary five years later.

A member of many church boards and committees, the bishop was director of the Wesley Foundation at Stanford in 1940-42, and is an able and prolific writer on religious subjects.

Assigned to assist Bishop Kennedy as the Long Beach district superintendent is Rev. Douglas Walters, for nine years the pastor of the First Methodist Church of Monrovia.
