

# PTA Milk Bowl Football Carnival Begins Tonight; Locals To Play Tomorrow

Because it is a "family affair," Los Angeles Tenth District P.T.A. and the L. A. City Schools Policy Determining Committee are sponsoring the 16th annual "Milk Bowl Football Carnival," to be held tonight at the Pasadena Rose Bowl and tomorrow at the L. A. Coliseum.
